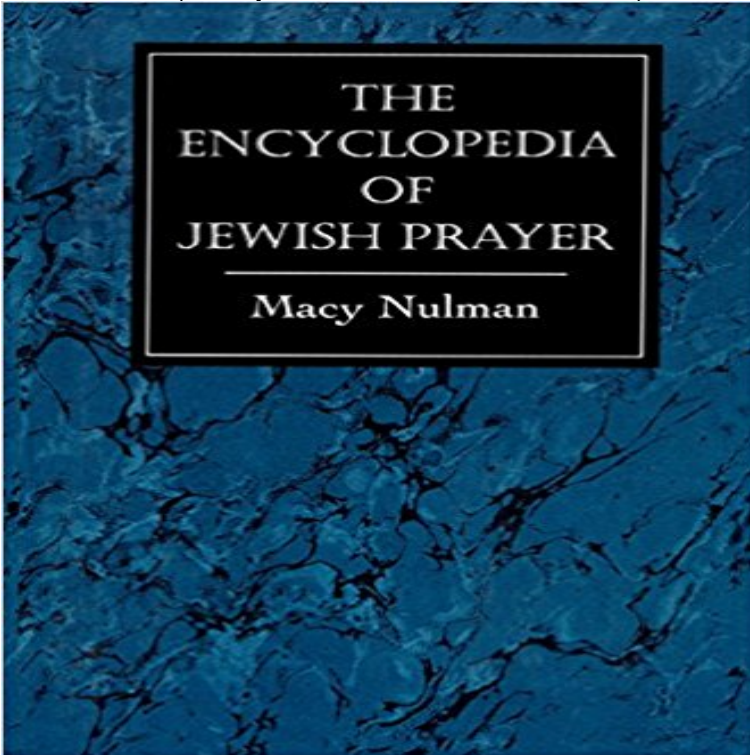

piyyutim, recited on special Sabbaths, Holy Days, and festivals.
