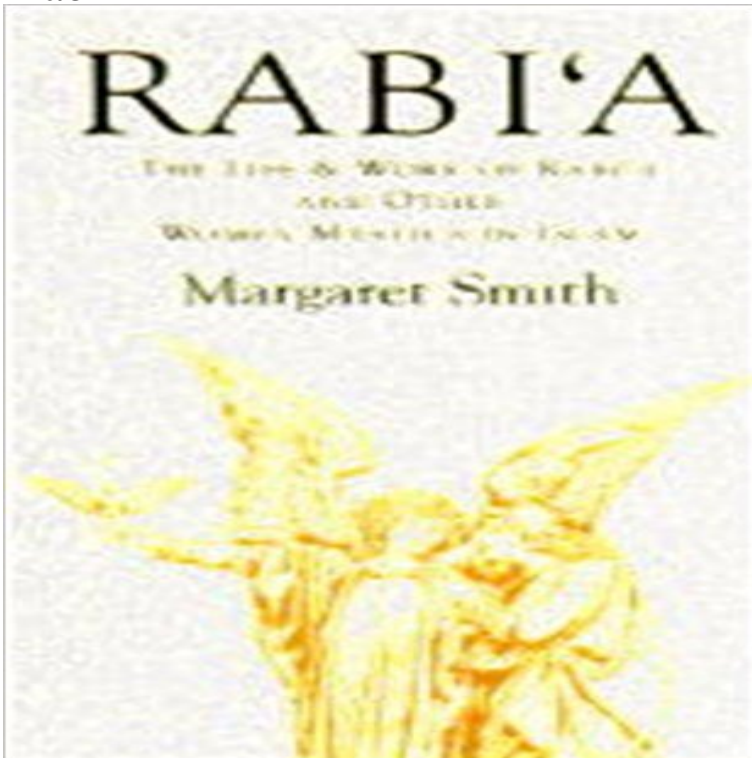


## RabiA
