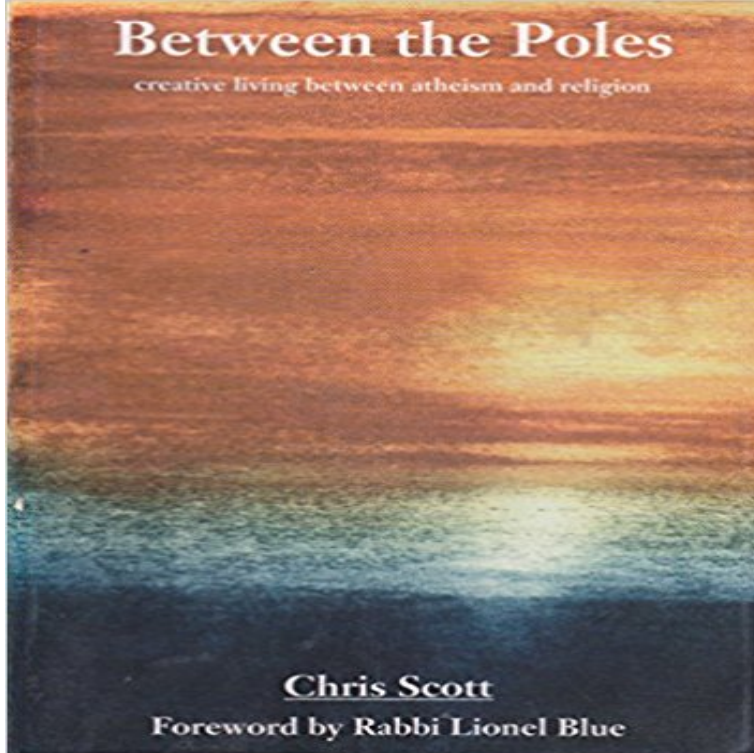


Between the Poles: Creative Living Between Atheism and Religion
